

HONR 229L Final Paper

On class website, it is stated:

Grades will be determined based on short writing assignments for each reading (**50%**), a mid-term paper (**25%**), evaluation of student led discussion and class participation during the semester (**10%**), and a brief final paper that reflects each student's view of the final project, connecting to the real world issues related to the governance of climate change (**15%**).

as well as:

Final Paper: 3 pages maximum single spaced. For the last few weeks of class students will break into three groups, select roles within each group, and assemble an energy plan. The plans will be presented Thurs, 5 Dec. Final paper is due Mon, 9 Dec 2019 (last day of the semester), just before midnight. The paper should reflect your view of the energy plan, defending or critiquing the plan from your perspective in the framing of the plan. You are welcome to also include commentary on the problems and/or success the real-world is having regarding a transition towards renewable energy. More specifically, the **Final Paper** requirement is:

If you are one of the three Presidents, you are asked to:

Submit a 3 page, single spaced paper that expresses your view of the energy plan, the economic development plan, the population growth plan (if appropriate), and the measure developed to place a price on carbon, plus of course the International Agreement, defending or critiquing these documents from your perspective as leader of your respective country group. You are welcome to also include commentary on the challenges the real-world is facing regarding the transition to renewable energy and/or the governance of climate change.

If you are one of the three Negotiators, you are asked to:

Submit a 3 page, single spaced paper that includes the International Agreement (this counts towards the page total) as well as your view of the International Agreement, defending or critiquing this plan from your perspective as negotiator for of your respective country group. You are welcome to also include commentary on the challenges the real-world is facing regarding the transition to renewable energy and/or the governance of climate change.

If you are one of the three Economic Ministers, you are asked to:

Submit a 3 page, single spaced paper that includes the Economic Plan from your region (this counts towards the page total) as well as your view of the Economic Plan, defending or critiquing this plan from your perspective as Energy Minister for of your respective country group. You are welcome to also include commentary on the challenges the real-world is facing regarding the transition to renewable energy and/or the governance of climate change.

If you are one of the three Energy Ministers, you are asked to:

Submit a 3 page, single spaced paper that includes the Energy Plan from your region (this counts towards the page total) as well as your view of the Energy Plan, defending or critiquing this plan from your perspective as Energy Minister for of your respective country group. You are welcome to also include commentary on the challenges the real-world is facing regarding the transition to renewable energy and/or the governance of climate change.

If you are one of the Senators, you are asked to:

Submit a 3 page, single spaced paper that includes the Population Growth Plan from your region *if appropriate* (this counts towards the paper total), as well as your view of the Energy and Economic plans developed by your group, from your perspective as Senator for of your respective country group. You are welcome to also include commentary on the challenges the real-world is facing regarding the transition to renewable energy and/or the governance of climate change.
